




Everyone was really enthusiastic to learn about and play these amazing instruments!

healthwatch Accessible Info Survey

Can you and your family access health and care information easily?

Accessible information means that everyone should get information and communication they can understand from key organisations, including:

- health bodies like GPs, dentists, hospitals, and clinics,
- care providers like Councils and care homes.

It's good practice for other organisations like council departments, colleges and workplaces to provide information in a format people can understand too.

<u>Healthwatch York</u> are working with <u>Healthwatch North Yorkshire</u> and <u>North Yorkshire County Council</u> to try to ensure that you get health and care information in a format you can access, and they want to know your experiences...

Your feedback may be used in a report about the accessibility of health and care information. This will help to make organisations aware of:

- their responsibilities under the <u>Accessible Information Standard</u>
- how they can improve services

Your feedback will be anonymous but you will be asked a few questions about yourself at the end.

If you're happy to talk to Healthwatch more about your experiences, please provide your name and contact details at the end of the survey. This information will only be used to contact you and will not be linked to your responses which will remain anonymous.

Deaf Works Everywhere



Deaf Works Everywhere (DWE) is campaign from the <u>National Deaf Children's Society</u> to get more deaf young people into work – and into jobs that inspire them.

Many deaf young people believe their career options are limited but with the right support they can work everywhere!

Over the next 3 years, the campaign aims to help raise aspirations and challenge expectations of what deaf people can achieve by fighting for better careers support, more work experience and more volunteering opportunities.

The READY study (Recording Emerging Adulthood in Deaf Youth) is a ground-breaking study funded by the <u>National Deaf Children's Society</u> and led by the Universities of Manchester and Edinburgh to better understand the challenges faced by deaf young people as they become independent adults.

You might remember us sharing information about it in our newsletter. Perhaps you were one of the 150 deaf young people who took part!

The Year 2 READY report is now available and includes new evidence in the areas of language and communication, social networks, health, wellbeing and self-determination that will help to improve the support that deaf young people get in future.

The findings are available in English and BSL and are well worth a read!
